 Advanced Training in Trauma Focused-Cognitive Behavior Therapy - Kelly Wilson, George (Tripp) Ake Sponsored by Catholic Charities & CAMHD

Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) is currently one of the most effective evidence-based treatments for alleviating posttraumatic stress symptoms in children. This workshop will provide a brief overview of the supporting research to date and will highlight all of the TF-CBT treatment components. The workshop will also address assessment of trauma symptoms and how to best determine if TF-CBT is a good fit for children. Participants will be provided with several resources to enhance their understanding of evidence-based practices such as TF-CBT and will be encouraged to engage in exercises such as role plays in order to demonstrate how clinicians might effectively utilize these components. This session describes the development of the learning collaborative model as an effective process for disseminating evidence-based protocol. The workshop will also highlight how to overcome common barriers to implementation of TF-CBT including clinician avoidance of manualized treatment, lack of model-specific supervision, and difficulty identifying appropriate cases. This session requires an introductory training of TF-CBT.

2. Assessment & Treatment of Children Who Sexually Abuse - Lucinda Rasmussen Sponsored by Children's Justice Center of Oahu

This workshop presents the national trends in the assessment, treatment, and management of sexually abusive youth, and then discusses specific techniques in assessment and treatment approaches. The Trauma Outcome Process Assessment (TOPA Model) is an integrated ecologically based practice model formulated for assessing and treating traumatized youth. This workshop will discuss the application of the TOPA model in assessing and treating traumatized children who engage in problematic and/or abusive sexual behavior. The TOPA model's four-step assessment process will be described including incorporating empirically guided assessment tools such as the innovative risk assessment tool, *MEGAF*. Strategies for completing assessment interviews and engaging children and parents in treatment will be presented. Participants will learn about interventions that integrate expressive play therapy and cognitive-behavioral therapy using various treatment modalities (i.e., group treatment, individual therapy, family therapy).

 New Areas of Focus in Combat Related Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Treatment - James Spira, Alison Aosved, Julia Whealin, Alyssa Mansfield, Casey Taft, Leslie Morland Sponsored by the National Center for PTSD

Most diagnoses and treatment for PTSD are based upon experience and research with civilian female assault victims or single disasters. More recently, these principles and practices have been applied to combat veterans, who have a unique set of issues that likely influence the PTSD onset and treatment outcome. This workshop examines the unique set of factors that are present in combat PTSD, with assessment and treatment implications. This day long workshop will include presentations on Polytrauma, Military Sexual Trauma, Family Issues, Post-Deployment Violence in the Family and Community, TeleMentalHealth Treatment for PTSD, Access to Care, and Early Detection & Prevention of PTSD.

#### HALF-DAY MORNING WORSKSHOPS 9:00 am - 12:00 pm

4. Disorders of Attachment: Causes, Prevention & Treatment - Keith Kuboyama

This workshop will provide a brief history of attachment theory, discuss what attachment is and how it develops, the role of attachment in the developing brain, what happens when things go wrong, and the use of these concepts for prevention and therapeutic strategies, and hypotheticals. Practical application of attachment theory will also be discussed for children and youth, and its uses in treatment are also emphasized.

 X Valuing Differences: Multiculturalism in Service Delivery Systems - Bettye Mitchell Sponsored by NASW-HI

Bettye Mitchell will facilitate an interactive session looking at cultural differences and the need to recognize diversity in relationship to one's life experience in working with individuals in service delivery systems. This session will explore multiculturalism in the workplace; what culture is, how culture works, the culture make-up within our communities and emerging generational diversity. This workshop will identify the benefits of valuing diversity and strategies for effective multi-cultural interactions for the most effective delivery of services to diverse populations. Participants will engage in interactive self-awareness, sensitivity exercises regarding personal biases that help shape life experiences in enhancing a greater understanding of differences in individuals who are aged, with disabilities, ethnicities, geographical areas, religions, gender, etc.

 Child Custody Evaluations with Allegations of Domestic Violence & Child Abuse - Richard Ducote, Dara Carlin, Trina Yamada, & Robert Geffner

This workshop presents the major controversies and issues involved in complex child custody cases when there are allegations of domestic violence and/or child abuse. The presenters represent the legal, mental health, forensic, and advocacy perspectives that are involved in these types of cases. The presenters focus on ethical issues, appropriate techniques in actually conducting such child custody evaluations, as well as local statutes, legal arguments and strategies, and forensic evaluation techniques in distinguishing abuse cases from high conflict ones. Distinctions between alienation and rejection as they apply to these cases are discussed by the presenters. Key issues of attachment, child development, and trauma are included.

8. Natural Disasters: Anytime, Anywhere – Your Role in Helping & Healing - *Raymond Scurfield Sponsored by NASW – HI* 

This workshop provides an overview of natural disaster trauma, the 6 stages of disaster recovery, interventions and outcomes. Applicable to a range of natural disasters, the emphasis is on knowledge derived from the presenter's experiences (a) coordinating and being a member of post-hurricane disaster relief teams for 3 months post-lniki and (b) 4 years of Hurricane Katrina-related experiences as a Gulf Coast resident, professor, survivor and provider.

9. Survivor Leadership in Developing Trauma Informed Systems - 4 consumer-survivor leaders from the National Center for Trauma Informed Care

Sponsored by the National Center for Trauma Informed Care

Two male and two female consumer-survivor leaders from diverse backgrounds and experiences will be discussing how to develop peer support programs across systems that are trauma informed. Homelessness, criminal justice, mental health and substance abuse issues will be the focus. The presenters will share their own experiences and what can be done to develop peer support systems of care.

## 2011 PRESENTERS

Judge Steven S. Alm, JD, was sworn in as a Circuit Court Judge in Honolulu in 2001. He was the former United States Attorney for the District of Hawai'i from 1994-2001. As U.S. Attorney, he made federal-state-local cooperation his highest priority. In 2004, Judge Alm brought together key stakeholders to improve the felony probation system on Oahu, creating the successful HOPE Program, built around multi-level accountability.

Frances Ashe-Goins, RN, MPH, currently serves as the Acting Director for the Office on Women's Health, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). She oversees numerous programs related to women's health issues including HIV/AIDS, domestic violence, rape/sexual assault, mental health, lupus awareness, diabetes, organ/tissue donation, and minority and international women's health. Throughout her years of service, she has implemented several innovative programs and national summits to address HIV/AIDS, Violence against Women and the Lupus Educational Awareness Project which received national attention.

Tonier Cain is a consumer advocate who has spoken nationally on trauma, incarceration and recovery. She is a team leader for the National Center for Trauma-Informed Care, which provides consultation, technical assistance, and training. Ms. Cain is the subject of "Healing Neen," a documentary based on her life as she moved through multiple systems of care.

Wynetta "Bunny" Carl Matsuura, PhD, MPH, MSN, APRN-BC, is the Director of Nursing Services at Kapi'olani Child Protection Center. She has specialized in the assessment of child maltreatment and has served as a nursing consultant on the Multidisciplinary Child Protection Center Team. She currently serves on the Hawai'i FASD Task Force. She is a board certified Pediatric Nurse Practitioner, whose assessments include early screening for FASD. Her clinical and research interests include early child development, health care of foster children, and FASD prevention and detection.

Dara Carlin, MA, has spent her 20+ year career working in various social service capacities. Ms. Carlin's dedication to ending abuse began as a teen volunteering in NY. After graduating in sociology, Dara focused on child abuse, juvenile justice and family violence issues. She is most recognized in her current role as a Domestic Violence Survivor Advocate, Consultant and Trainer.

Steven Choy, PhD, is a licensed Clinical Psychologist and the Director of the Kapi olani Child Protection Center (KCPC). He specializes in the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of child maltreatment and is currently the psychological consultant for the Hawai'i Juvenile Drug Court Program. He serves as a Psychology Consultant on the Multidisciplinary Child Protection Team and on various State Boards dealing with Child Welfare issues. He is also the director of the Hawai'i Center for Parent-Child Interaction Therapy, which is part of KCPC.

Richard Ducote, JD, is an attorney who has specialized in representing abused women and children nationwide for 31 years. His primary focus has been child custody cases in which courts have placed children in the custody of their abusers and have punished the protective parent. He wrote the first law in the country which prohibited the granting of custody to abusive parents. In October, 2005, he was featured in the PBS documentary Breaking the Silence: Children's Stories exploring the failure of family courts to protect abused women and children.

Jean Dunbar, MA, is the Associate Director of Intervention Services at the YWCA of Calgary and oversees upwards of 15 domestic violence intervention programs. She has worked in the domestic violence field for over 17 years. Jean is a Certified Child Psychotherapist and Play Therapist with the Canadian Association for Child and Play Therapy and is recognized as an expert witness for children exposed to domestic violence in the Court of Queens Bench in Alberta, Canada.

Kai Duponte, MSW, is Project Director of the Hawai'i Child Welfare Education Collaboration (HCWEC) at the University of Hawai'i's Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work. Her areas of special interest include child welfare, cultural awareness, racial disproportionality and issues affecting Native Hawaiians. In addition to running the HCWEC program and presenting trainings preparing social workers to work with Native Hawaiians, she is involved with planning conferences that take place in Hawai'i such as The Institute for Violence, Abuse and Trauma (IVAT) and the International Society on Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect.

Robert Geffner, PhD, ABPP, ABN, a Diplomate in Clinical Neuropsychology and in Family Psychology, is Founding President of the Family Violence and Sexual Assault Institute, and Alliant International University's (AIU) Institute on Violence, Abuse & Trauma; he is also a Clinical Research Professor of Psychology at California School of Professional Psychology, AIU, San Diego; he has been a Licensed Psychologist and Licensed Marriage & Family Therapist for over 30 years.

Candace Heisler, JD served as an Assistant District Attorney for the City and County of San Francisco for over 25 years. She provides law enforcement training on domestic violence for first responders, crisis negotiators, and investigators throughout California and trains probation officers and victim advocates about Elder Abuse and Domestic Violence. She is also an Assistant Adjunct Professor of Law at the University of California's Hastings College. She now teaches for and consults with a wide variety of state, local, and national governmental agencies as well as private organizations.

Lieutenant Michael Hertica (Ret.), MS, an instructor in the investigation of child abuse and domestic violence cases, is retired from the Torrance Police Department, where he served for 30 years. Past President of the Board of Directors of The California Professional Society on the Abuse of Children, he has served on the Board of the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children. He has also worked as a therapist with abused women and children in DV shelters.

Virginia Hinshaw, PhD, Chancellor of the University of Hawai'i at Manoa, is an academic leader with a distinguished record of accomplishment, including at her prior post as provost and executive vice chancellor, UC Davis, and before that at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Hinshaw is also a renowned scientist with expertise in microbiology, whose work over the past 25 years has aided in the understanding of the influenza virus and new approaches to vaccines.

Thompson, Child Welfare Training Academy and has provided training for Hawai'i State Department of Human Services (DHS) on engagement skills and effective communication. In addition, she worked in partnership to design, implement, and evaluate training provided to Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility staff on case management, documentation, historic trauma, adolescent development, and cultural awareness.

Bettye Mitchell, MA, is nationally recognized for her expertise in aging, protective services, elder abuse, leadership, training, program development, and cultural diversity. She currently serves as CEO of Life Span Care Consulting Group. Ms. Mitchell developed the Texas Adult Protective Services training program and later served as the Director of Training for the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services. She is a trained mediator and currently provides training in the areas of Diversity and Leadership Development. She currently serves as President-Elect of the National Committee for Prevention of Elder Abuse (NCPEA) after serving as the Educational Chair of NCPEA.

Noreen Mokuau, PhD, MSW, DSW, is Interim Dean and Professor at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa, Myron B. Thompson School of Social Work. Since 1983, she has served as Assistant Dean, Chair of the BSW Program, the PhD Program, and Interim Chair of the MSW Program. She has received the university's highest awards in the areas of teaching (UH Regents Excellence in Teaching) and community service (UH Community Service Award). Presently, she is Co-Principal Investigator and Director of Ha Kupuna: National Resource Center for Native Hawaiian Elders. She now specializes in integrating Hawaiian healing practices into social service agency treatment delivery.

Richard Paglinawan, MSW, has lectured on Hawaiian medicinal plants, ethnobotany, place names of Hawaiii, Hawaiian and Polynesian historical sites, Hawaiian legends and ho'oponopono. A descendant of Kapule, a warrior priest, who served in the armies of Kalaniopu'u and Kamehameha I, he is credited with helping recover the ancient martial art of lua, banned in post-contact times.

In addition, Dr. Ross is affiliated with the Headington Program at Fuller Graduate School of Psychology, a research lab that focuses on studies on the impact of exposure to international traumatic events, and the effects of vicarious trauma and direct exposure on relief and aid workers around the world and is co-chair of the NCTSN Secondary Traumatic Stress collaborative working group.

Raymond Monsour Scurfield, PhD, MSW is a Professor of Social Work at the University of Southern Mississippi (USM) Gulf Coast and former Director of the Katrina Research Center.
